Meeting Notes and Announcements

Report on the impact of COVID-19 on the rights of indigenous peoples. Pursuant to resolution 42/20 of the Human Rights Council, the [Special Rapporteur on the rights of indigenous peoples](#) dedicated his annual report to the General Assembly the impact of the COVID-19 on the rights of indigenous peoples. The report reviews existing initiatives undertaken by States, indigenous peoples and others to ensure that the rights and specific needs of indigenous peoples are considered and addressed in the fight against the pandemic.
